MARIBOR WORKSHOP

The second Training Workshop held in Maribor, Slovenia in January proved to be a resounding success. With 30 delegates, the 4 day workshop gave all the partners attending the opportunity to review the progress since the Liverpool Workshop. This included the transition from designing the data collection tools to the data collection phase, receiving an update on the piloting of the tools and raise specific questions regarding the city-specific requirements. The workshop was led by the University of Liverpool.



Arpana Verma introduced the meeting and set the tone for the workshop. The day was spent introducing and discussing the transition from the preparation of the tools to data collection and quality control followed by discussion of the existing data tool.

Day 2 was dedicated to the Adult survey starting off with a review of the piloting by Dan Pope. The workshop then split into breakaway groups to review the revised the survey relevant to each city and provide feedback on the methodological issues and then provided feedback to the whole workshop on their findings. The day ended with group training on

the adult database for data entry. Day 3 was dedicated to the Youth survey starting with a review of the piloting by Dan Pope.

Again, the workshop split into breakaway groups to review the revised the youth survey relevant to each city and then provided feedback to the whole workshop on their findings. The day ended with group training on the adult database for data entry.

The final day was devoted to resolving any issues that came to light from the workshop, discussing ethics issues and general management issues.

The Liverpool, Manchester and Maribor teams were thanked for their hard work in organising the meeting and it was acknowledged by all the delegates that the workshop had been useful and informative and that all the delegates had the opportunity to discuss their specific requirements and left the workshop with a greater understanding of the project.

Following the meeting, the wealth of feedback generated from the workshop was reviewed in depth. The database, data collection, protocols and surveys have been revised based on the outcomes from the workshop.

WHERE AND WHAT ARE WE UP TO NOW?

Since the start of this year, a major achievement of work package 4 has been the development of the four instruments that will be used for existing data collection, the adult and youth survey and policy-makers questionnaire. Piloting for the adult and youth surveys was undertaken in November and December 2009 by the University of Liverpool team and the findings disseminated to partners at the Maribor workshop in January 2010.

Existing data collection has begun in all the EURO-URHIS 2 cities. The University of Manchester has collected all the country level data for all the existing indicators for all the 13 countries in EURO-URHIS 2.

Ethical approval has recently been secured in the UK to carry out both the adult and youth surveys and individual local ethical approval is now being

sought by city partners.

The next step in the project is that of commencement of the adult and youth surveys. In order to discuss the plans for 2010, a work package 5 meeting was organised on the 1st and 2nd



March in Cluj-Napoca, Romania at the Iuliu Hatieganu University of Medicine and Pharmacy.

The first day of the two day meeting started with a review of the timetable for the collection of data and quality control. Ioan Bocsan, work package 5 leader and chair of the meeting underlined the main aspects on monitoring WP5 in the EURO-URHIS 2 project and presented a

general schema of tasks and activity timesheet for the work to be undertaken.

The surveys, which have already been drafted and agreed upon, will be translated by all the partners by the end of March and will be delivered in each urban area simultaneously to allow comparability of data between urban areas.

The data collected through the surveys will be combined with already existing data that will be collected by the partners by the end of April. This combination of routinely available data and survey data will provide a sustainable methodology for collection, analysis and implementation of urban health indicators across Europe.

Prior to the initiation of the adult and youth surveys in the participating cities a further workshop (workshop 3) is planned on 5th-8th July in Bordeaux, France.

IN THE NEWS

New European Urban Intergroup

On the 24th of February, the first meeting of the newly established Urban intergroup of the European parliament took place. The Urban intergroup is an informal group gathering more than 70 MEPs from different countries and different political groups and cooperating with several external partners. It is chaired by [MEP Mr. Jan Olbrycht](#), and it replaces and continues the work initiated by the [Intergroup on Urban housing](#) of the previous EP mandate (2004-2009). A dedicated website of the intergroup will be soon available.

How could your city interact with Europe?

On 3 March 2010 the European Commission proposed **Europe 2020 – A strategy for smart, sustainable and inclusive growth**.

The European Council is now requested to endorse the strategy's overall approach and the EU headline targets and to give its final approval to the strategy. However some important issues relevant to local and regional authorities still remain open in the strategy. It is crucial that they are adequately addressed before final adoption (June European Council).

Therefore the Committee of the Regions (CoR) is launching a follow-up Consultation of European Regions and Cities - "Your voice on Europe 2020" with the deadline on 12 April 2010.
